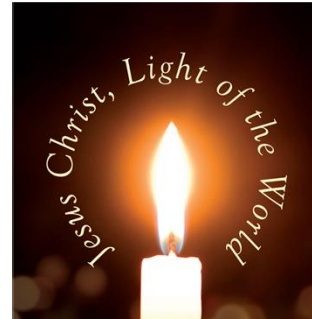

Walk in The Light!



"Come, descendants of Jacob, let us walk in the light of the Lord."

-Isaiah 2:5

"If we walk in the light, as God is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, God's Son, purifies us from all sin."

-1 John 1:7

One of the most beautiful parts of the Advent season is all of the lights that decorate and illuminate the space around us. Everything from Christmas trees, to candlelit windows, to colorful Christmas displays on front yards, to creatively crafted storefronts, the many varieties of light help to bring a special delight and wonder to the season.

These lights however, are meant to bring us more than a twinkling, festive feel. They are meant to enlighten us to the truth of the One who came and will come again as "The Light of the World." Beyond that, they also serve as an invitation for us, as a people of faith, to discover what it means for us to, "Walk in The Light!"

Recently it seems that we don't have to go very far to observe the reality that we are still a people walking in darkness. All you have to do is turn on the evening news, browse the internet, read a paper, or listen to the conversations around you to discover this for yourselves. Shootings on college campuses, protesting

pipelines, increasing divisions over race, growing fears for the marginalized, growing frustrations for the middle class, worries of security for both the old and the young, wars, and natural disasters. While the world seems to be spinning more and more out of control, let us pause to remember...it is precisely into a world such as ours that Jesus was born as the light of the world. And it is into a world such as ours that we are invited to "Walk in the Light."

To walk in the light is a conscious choice to live visibly different from the rest of the world. To walk in the light is to "Awaken Hope" amid conversations of despair and anxiety. It is to not only imagine another way that the world could be, but to actively live as if our actions were helping to bring that imagined future into reality! To walk in the light is to "Welcome Peace" at all times, even amidst fear, mistrust, and growing hatred. It is to recognize peace will not come from division, but from reconciliation and creating safe space where everyone can belong. To walk in the light is to "Celebrate Joy" at all times, even amidst stress and worry over what we do not have or about losing what we do. It is to take a break from the tired view of how far we have to go, to rejoice in the reality of how far we have come, and the goodness of God that is and has been at work in us! To walk in the light is to "Share Love" at all times, even amidst the words of hatred and the actions of violence that so define the ways we tend to relate to one another in our world. It is to live out the same forgiveness, kindness, generosity, and compassion towards one another that Christ has shown towards us. To walk in the light is certainly no easy task, but the good news is that we do not walk alone, rather we follow the light of the world, and we are simply meant to keep following, no matter how poorly we might have reflected that light in the past. We come together as those who are prone to walk in darkness, and at times we still do, yet the light continues to draw us, and the more we follow, the more light we see!!

This Advent we will wonder together what it means to "Walk in the light." Together we will explore the themes of "Awakening Hope," "Welcoming Peace," "Celebrating Joy," and "Sharing Love." During this Advent season, in addition to our regular Sunday worship services, there are other opportunities for us to walk in the light together on Wednesday for soup and bread Advent evenings. They will be held on November 30th, December 7th, 14th, and 21st. Each evening will begin with a light soup and bread dinner at 6:00pm followed by a brief worship service ending before 8:00pm, all held in the Heritage House. On Sunday, December 18th we will be having our Sunday School Christmas Program

as a part of our morning worship service and an all-church potluck and Christmas celebration after the service. Plans for our annual Christmas-Eve candlelight service are in the works and more details will follow. Also, we will be worshipping together on Christmas Day at 10:30am in the sanctuary.

As we prepare to welcome the Light of The World, let us learn to walk in the light through this Advent Season, that together we can help our world of darkness find a new way.

Capital Campaign

We close one full year of our Capital Campaign, we have much to celebrate. Several pledges and other donations came in this past month totaling \$21,180! This brings our total received to \$520,468 with a remaining \$76,133 in pledges. That means we only have \$153,399 to go to reach our \$750 goal! We are very close to 4/5 of the way there! We are on the home stretch! Thank you to all who have contributed generously! Let's keep those donations coming in so we can finish it off in style.

One way you may choose to help this holiday season is by encouraging your loved ones to give a gift to the Capital Campaign in your name. It's a win-win as your friends and relatives do not have to stress over what to buy for you, and you can cut down on "stuff" while helping with the rebuilding. The gift may also be tax deductible for the giver, based on tax law. This gift can be given from anywhere, as donations can be received from the church website at www.schohariereformedchurch.org or the GoFundMe church page "ReBuild SRC."

If you would like to give a gift to the building fund in honor of someone, there are Christmas cards in the narthex you can use. This is a great gift for the person who has everything!

We are also working on getting a cookbook together, hit some snags with that one, but it's still in the works. There will be a collage making class in February for those of us that get cabin fever in the winter months.

A former pastor, Robert Hoeksema, told us that your church needs help restoring the sanctuary. Schoharie Reformed Church was Bob's first church. He and Lucille have fond memories. Sounds like you have been through a very rough time and we hope this donation will help with your long ordeal."





Pastors' Sabbatical

The Schoharie Reformed Church was named a recipient of the 2016 Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Program administered through Christian Theological Seminary! We are one of 147 congregations across the United States who were selected, and the only congregation in the Capital Region.

While the consistory had already agreed to give our pastors sabbatical time away next year, this grant will allow the pastors and congregation both to do some creative and renewing activities during that time. \$15,000 will go toward the congregational plan, which will include providing for leadership while the pastors are away, as well as some special guests and an all congregation retreat at Camp Fowler. Save the dates: August 25-27, 2017!

The additional funds will allow the pastors to travel and experience various renewal activities, related to their theme of "reconnecting to God, themselves, and each other." Mike will focus on food and music as a means for reconnection, and Sherri will focus on relationships and nature. The sabbatical time will begin at the end of May and will conclude the middle of September.

We are thankful to the planning team, which included last and this year's consistory, the grant writing team, and some additional congregants, including Paul Schultz. Well done to the grant writing team, including Dusty Putnam, Karen and Bill Olewnick, and the pastors!

We have a rough plan and have received the funds! Would you like to be a part of the implementation team to further develop and help the plans become reality? This will include planning for the retreat, planning dinners, organizing pastoral coverage and worship, and any other special events. Please let the pastors know as planning will begin soon.

	<u>Skill Level</u>
a. Balcony – Pull up the remaining old blue carpet. Pull those carpet tacks and nails.	Low
b. Balcony Pews – Shim and tighten certain units.	Moderate
c. Balcony Pews – Fill nail holes and prep for paint. Paint.	Low
d. Organ – Finish vacuuming floor and furniture alongside the organ.	Low
e. Rear Doors (upper & lower) – Install door levers. Clean paint off interior brass door lever.	Low
f. Rear Door (upper) - Wash spill stain off aluminum threshold and concrete floor.	Low
g. Rear Doors (upper & lower) – Install door stops. <i>Requires research.</i>	Moderate
h. Lift Door (exterior) – weather strip door perimeter. <i>Requires research.</i>	Moderate
i. Basement – Disassemble homemade work platforms (no longer needed).	Low
j. New Balcony Rail – Clean mill scale and trim any sharp welds. Remove any surface rust. Fill holes. Mask, prime and paint. <i>Long, tedious, but rewarding.</i>	Moderate
