I wonder if you've ever had a morning where you woke up just before the alarm went off, you felt well-rested, and refreshed. The kids were up and getting themselves ready, in a pleasant mood, and eager to start the day. The coffee was already made when you came downstairs, the house was clean, the sun was shining, the birds were singing, and the text message you just received said your morning meeting was canceled!

Or

I wonder if you've ever had a morning where you woke up in a panic because you missed your alarm and overslept by twenty minutes. You fumbled out of bed certain you just got into it five minutes ago. The kids are grumbling as you pull them out of bed declaring this as some sort of abuse. You race downstairs to find it's cold and raining outside, and there is nothing in the house for breakfast but the bottom crumbs of the cereal box, and out-of-date milk because you were too tired to stop at the store last night, and the text message you just received reminds you of something that was due today and you totally forgot about it!

We can probably all relate to this on some level, and the majority of us probably find ourselves somewhere in between these two scenarios on most days. We have all experienced the feelings of joy, struggle, peace, frustration, excitement, and fatigue that comes with each day. But what about gratitude? Where does being thankful fit into our days? What if I told you that both of these scenarios offer the same number of reasons to give thanks, even if some of them are a lot harder to see than others?

Yet all too often, if we're not careful, our gratitude can become something that happens only when we feel like it, or when our circumstances are so good that we cannot help it, or else during that once-a-year tradition that takes place around the Thanksgiving table. So how do we keep an "attitude of gratitude," especially when the storm hits, or on the dark days, or in the hard times? How do we keep "singing when the evening comes" as the song above reminds us, with whatever has passed and whatever lies before us? Or how do we truly "give thanks in all circumstances" as the Apostle Paul encourages us?

What this does NOT mean is that we see our troubles, or the troubles of others as "less than" they are, or "not as bad" as they seem. Rather, it is not about the troubles at all. Instead, it is about what lies beyond them. It is a testimony to our hope in the larger reality of the Gospel. The "Good News" of God's love and promises that we claim for ourselves and for one another. We truly believe that one of the most powerful testimonies we can live out in the world is to live lives of gratitude!

At the heart of giving thanks in difficult times are three important things we need to remember and to work to put into practice. The first is, that **God is in control**. Even when we feel alone, God is with us, and God is bringing us through. We can trust in God's faithfulness, and redeeming power, even when we cannot see it. The second is, to **offer forgiveness**. Holding onto a grudge means that we cannot grasp onto gratitude. Yet

when we work towards forgiveness, as difficult as it can be, we are reminded of the grace God has given us, and in that grace, we can find gratitude. The last thing is, to **keep our joy.** There are many things in the world today that threaten to steal our joy, and amidst all of the demands of each day we can often find ourselves giving our joy away, or setting it aside. Yet joy is God's gift to us and we are invited to claim it for ourselves each and every day.

During November as we turn our hearts towards Stewardship once again, we want to celebrate the reality that our God has given us not just 10,000 reasons, but a whole lot more, to give thanks each and every day of our lives. We want this to be our testimony not just on the good days, but on the hard days as well. That is why we will look together at recognizing God is in control, at offering forgiveness, and at keeping our joy, so that this may be the hope and strength of our lives, as well as our testimony to the world.

In November we will have testimonies of God at work in the lives of our congregation, special music, an activity, and our annual consecration Sunday on November 19th, during our morning worship service. We hope you will join us for this special season because YOU are one of our 10,000 reasons at the Schoharie Reformed Church!

Fall Clean-Up

Saturday, November 4, 9:00 AM. The focus will be on raking leaves, cleaning out the flower bed, trimming shrubs, and general outside clean-up in preparation for winter. Donations Being a church facility, from time to time there is a need for a second fridge and a large upright freezer; keep the Fellowship Hall in mind if you learn of a good clean unit for donation. Also looking for a large flat screen TV (55"+) to hang on the wall.

Anyone need a pew? As reported previously, some of the pews will not be used and are being replaced by loose "worship seats". We've been keeping those pews for parts and "just in case". As a couple of folks recently have inquired about acquiring a pew for their home, we are letting everyone know that those pews are available to Congregation members. First come, first served. Winter is coming

Snow After a 1" snowfall, our snow plow contractor plows the parking lot and shovels the steps, ramp, and the street sidewalk. Lesser amounts, however, are our responsibility - so please be encouraged to grab a broom and/or shovel for the nuisance snows that pop up all winter long. Don't wait for someone else to do it. Especially keep the steps and ramp clear so the sun can do its thing thereby reducing usage of ice melting agents.

Note that we use plastic shovels (without steel edges) to minimize damage to the wooden steps and ramp. When necessary, there is a beige plastic tote full of magnesium chloride on the Heritage House porch. Compared to rock salt, magnesium chloride is less corrosive to the steel fasteners holding together the wooden steps and ramps.

Heat Both buildings have programmable thermostats. If you need to raise the temperature for an event, simply press the up arrow until the desired temperature shows (typically 68°). And remember to turn it down when you leave. If the schedule needs permanent adjustment AND you are comfortable doing so, then go ahead and change the program. If not, contact Dave Toborg.



The children are learning the Lord's Prayer currently. They will also be involved in several service projects throughout the upcoming months including Thanksgiving cards to members of local churches.



Sunday School Update
