


## There's No Place like Home?

"Go from your country, your people, and your father's household to the land I will show you."

-Genesis 12: 1



Let's face it, in Genesis 12:1-5 Abram, as he was then known, was leading and living a quiet and contented life as far as we know. God calls Abram to leave his father's house and the country and go to a place probably unknown to him; a place where God will lead him to settle and become a nation.

For that matter, let me also include Moses in Exodus 3:1-12. Moses is tending the flock of sheep of his fatherin-law Jethro when angels approach him and God calls him to lead his people, the Israelites, out of their bondage in Egypt. They are on their way to a new home, the Promised Land.

While we read that Moses in verse 11 questions God and wonders, "Who am I to do this task and bring the Israelites out of their captivity," we don't read that in the Abram text. With Abram, he went and did as God directed. Abram trusted God. Life is good. We see that phrase printed on hats and tshirts. After all, with life being so good, why fool around to make life better? But while we may think, "Life is good and flowing smoothly, the rhythm of our days is ordered and in sync; let's leave well enough alone," God has a call for each of us and as Christians, God has a better place for us. There are times where life is a struggle and we long for something better, or we might balk or make excuses, like Moses, and question what God is doing with our life to disturb the peace. Do we see God's calling us to a better place as disturbing the peace, or as an opportunity for something better?

In Abram, we find that he trusts God and answers the call to become a great nation. His journey was not always easy and neither is ours. Will we trust God to lead us to where God needs us to be? Will we trust God to bring us to a place that is better than what we know, to a place that is more perfect? Jesus went ahead and has prepared a place for us to be with God.

As we move into a new season, let God guide you, answer the call of God, and trust in what God is doing in your life to bring you to a more perfect place; a home and place better than you ever could have imagined.

#### Food Pantry Report - August 2017

The Schoharie Community Food Pantry continues to be utilized on a regular basis by 60 to 80 families per month. Donations of food are always appreciated, especially such items as peanut butter and jelly, tuna fish, pasta sauce and soups. As a reminder, financial donations can be made directly to the Regional Food Bank, designating the money to the Schoharie Community Food Pantry.

The food pantry has some volunteer needs as well. We are in need of volunteers on Tuesday and Thursday mornings, from approximately 8:30 until 10:00. These volunteers are responsible for receiving food that has been donated from Hannaford. The food needs to be weighed, shelved and recorded. Training is provided, and volunteers do not have to commit to every week. We also need a driver who would be willing to pick up food from Hannaford and bring it to the food pantry on the 1<sup>st</sup> Thursday of every month.


A volunteer is needed to work at the pantry on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday of every month. Additionally, we could use some more substitute drivers, receivers and pantry workers to fill in as needed from time to time. Finally, it would be nice to have someone in charge of cleaning the pantry on a monthly basis, basically mopping the floor and cleaning the refrigerator. Thank you to everyone who helped with camp this year! You were greatly appreciated and hope to see you all again next year.



They accept donations of gently used or new clothing in sizes preemie- adult 8XL\*. Your donation can prevent a child having to be removed from their nonabusive family member, solely because they lack items necessary for sustainability. No donation is too small!

They are also dangerously low or out of the following items:

- Laundry Detergent-100% Depleted
- Boys and Girls Deodorant- 100% Depleted
- Feminine Hygiene Products (pads specifically)
- Juice Boxes- 100% Depleted
- Boys & Girls Undergarments (Must be new)-Most Sizes Depleted
- Conditioner- 100% Depleted

MAIN THEME: How has Jesus called you to follow in this season of life?


September 24: PREPARING FOR THE JOURNEY Mark 13:28-37 // The Parable of the Fig Tree

This passage of Scripture tells us to keep alert for when God will break through in the world. MAIN THEME: How do we stay alert to the ways God is working in the world?

In keeping with the theme of staying alert, we will enter worship "shoeless." This came from a Time for Youth Message; we discovered that when Moses was in the presence of God, he was asked by God to remove his sandals as he stood on sacred ground (Exodus 3:5).

We'll leave our shoes in the Narthex and out of the way as we enter worship.
