





Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed! It is the season of Easter, but it is a far different Easter for all of us



in this time of physical distancing and quarantine as we try to stem the tide of this global pandemic. It has been, and continues to be different, hard, and grief-filled in a lot of ways. We have been learning new ways of interacting with each other through screens and at distances. Our kids and teachers are adjusting to new ways of doing school and working hard to provide effective space for learning and being. Simple routines like going to the grocery store are more challenging with limited supplies, staff, time, numbers of people, and one-way aisles. Many of us are finding other challenges at work and at home, as well as the compounding grief as more and more things get postponed or cancelled. Others of us are dealing with job loss, worries about businesses, economic difficulties, struggles with addiction, needs for food or shelter, and an overall anxiety about the future. We also acknowledge other illnesses, and other losses that are unrelated but have been made much more complicated during these challenging times.

In our broader circles we continue to pray for those who are sick, or who have lost loved ones due to this virus. We also think of the many hospital workers and essential employees who continue to go out and do their work while trying to keep themselves and their families healthy.

We are also experiencing times of joy and new discoveries during this pandemic as well. Some of us are learning new skills and expressing ourselves in different ways. Many of us are visiting more online, and some relationships have even gotten stronger through this. Businesses are finding creative ways to stay open and meet needs. People across the country are making an effort to stay connected to one another. We are sharing more of the things that make us laugh and touch our hearts. All of these changing circumstances, challenges, new learnings, anxieties, griefs and joys bring a whole mix of emotions that we continue to face within ourselves and with each other each day.

Into all of this, Jesus is Risen! Easter doesn't keep its distance, and the resurrection isn't cancelled. You can't quarantine the good news! Jesus is risen in all the fullness of glory and power into our world and into our lives wherever and however we may be! In this beautiful resurrection scene from John's Gospel, we read Jesus asking Mary, "Woman, why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?" He doesn't tell her to quit crying, or that she has no need to feel sad. Instead Jesus invites her to share her sorrows with him. I love the look of compassion and concern on the face of Jesus in the painting above. The beauty of Easter is that Jesus makes room for our tears, and our feelings whatever they may be on this day. We don't have to put on a fake smile, or dress ourselves up in pretty new clothes to hide our true selves away. Jesus meets us as we are and invites us to share with him what is on our hearts and in our souls. Some of us may be tempted to deny our feelings, telling the story that, "I am not as bad off as..." But Jesus invites each of us to meet him as we are, however that may be for us.

Then after she has shared her sorrows, he calls her by name. A simple yet wonderful revelation takes place in that moment and she recognizes it is Jesus and responds "Rabboni!" The powerful Easter hope for us in this humble interaction is that the God who has died on the cross for our sins and is resurrected in glory meets us as we are, knows our name, and reveals to us the promise and hope of new life. In this season of Easter, we too are invited to meet Jesus, to share our honest selves, our tears, our longings, our fears, and our joys. As well as to rest, delight, and be renewed in the resurrection hope that Jesus knows us by name. God desires to know what is in our hearts to reveal God's very self to us as our Lord, Savior, and Teacher! Here is a poem from Ted Loder from his wonderful book of poem prayers, *Guerillas of Grace.* We shared it as a part of our Good Friday Online Worship, but it also seems fitting here as we continue to meet Jesus in this Easter Season! Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed!


# <u>A Note from the</u> <u>Pastors</u>

Spring Clean-Up



### Looking to do something outdoors while maintaining proper physical distancing?

To maintain physical distancing, Spring Clean-up will be different this year. Rather than working as a group on a specific Saturday, congregation members are asked to do things on their own at their own time. Following are tasks needing attention:

Branches, rake sycamore leaves. litter patrol.

Rake out gravel and dirt along driveways and parking lot.

Prune/clean-up plantings in front of the Sanctuary and around trees (check out the crocuses while you are there).

Clean-up along the brook behind the playground. Haul away branches and leaves.

Use your own tools (lawn rake, garden rake, hand pruner, lopper, shovel, wheelbarrow, pick-up truck, chainsaw, etc.). If you can haul away the debris, great. If not, leave it in neat piles and notify Dave Toborg.

# <u>Clothing Drop-Off Shed</u>

We are now hosting a St. Pauly Textile, Inc. clothing drop-off shed, behind the Heritage House. This used clothing company provides a convenient and clean donation program that serves the community while helping the SRC financially.

What kind of items can be donated? Useable clothing, shoes, belts, purses, blankets, sheets, curtains, pillowcases, and stuffed animals. Items need to be in tied plastic bags.

Unacceptable items are electronics, books, household items, toys, garbage, pillows, rags, or fabric scraps.

What does the company do? St. Pauly empties the shed weekly/biweekly depending on volume and pays us 4 cents per pound of clothing.

St. Pauly sells the clothing in bulk to other companies that, in turn, contract with government agencies, relief organizations, and private companies that redistribute the clothing around the world. The geographic destinations depends on what is happening in the world at any given time.

**Can the SRC use the clothing?** If there is ever a need, the SRC can sort through donations to pick out items for a specific need or event (i.e. family in need, rummage sale).
