"Why do you look for the living among the dead?" This familiar line from the resurrection story always stirs in me during the Easter season. Why? Because I (Pastor Mike) am continually amazed by my own propensity to continue in old and unhelpful habits despite knowing the negative impact they have on my life. I continue to turn to unhelpful ways of soothing stress and anxiety in my life, especially during this pandemic, with things like too much food, or too much television. I know these things tend to leave me more stuck than motivated, yet that is what I still tend to do. Pastor and Author Craig Barnes writes in his book, Pastor As Minor Poet, "I am always amazed at how people will choose the misery they know over the mystery they don't." Now, of course, I am NOT saying the food or television are bad in any sense. I have and will continue to enjoy my Easter candy, but I am also on a journey right now to discover the difference between "soothing" and "self-care." I think it has something to do with looking for the living among the dead. So, a question I am trying to ask myself during times of stress and anxiety is "What will give you life?"

I wonder how you would answer that question in this Easter season, or perhaps it is actually two important questions? What is giving you life AND how are you taking, or how will you take time to receive that life? Some things that I know give me life are art, playing basketball outside, or taking a hike in the woods. Music also gives me life. These things I know. I also know I don't tend to take the time for them that would be helpful. I also know I (Yes, even pastors) need to be better about spending time with God.

The Good News in all of this is that Jesus is risen! New Life is a continual invitation given to us by God. Each day has many moments to choose soothing or self-care, things that lead to death or to new life. There is grace in all of it to keep us from shame and to help us find courage, and there is also joy and life, even when it feels more like work than pleasure.

My prayer in this Easter Season, as I am confronted by the cross, is to move my life more and more among the living! I want to create more space and time in my life to receive the real life that God has for me. It is this life that will also help me bring life to all of the other places and relationships in my world. I desire this life for my own growth and transformation, for the good of the world, and ultimately for the glory of God. By the grace of God it is mine, and YOURS to receive!

Jesus is Risen! Receive your life!

Classis Report

Schoharie Classis met on Sat., March 13th via Zoom. The meeting was led by Pastor Mike Meyer-Veen, Classis President.



We had a wonderful time of worship and devotions led by Deb Silvernail.

Currently there are 8 Reformed Churches within our classis without installed pastors.

We had a Fowler report submitted by Laura O'Brien. Construction on a new shower house is underway. They have had a couple successful fundraisers. The "Fall Scattering" event in October resulted in \$52,589 being raised. A February "Cabin Fever" event took place at Wolf Hollow brewing company and allowed for people to gather outside for s'mores and snowshoeing.

Pastor Sherri spoke about upcoming Churches Learning Change programming. New opportunities for learning are being offered to all churches. Courses will be offered for church teams of 4-6 people or to individuals as well.

Sherrie Gray, Classis Treasurer, presented our 2020 Financial Report. The classis is financially strong and reduced the amount that churches paid in assessments for 2020.

Linda Gold will be installed as Fonda Reformed Church's new pastor on May 23rd.

Our next classis meeting will be held on May 25th at Fonda Reformed Church.

Regional Synod will be held on June 5th at Camp Fowler. This will likely be followed by a virtual meeting.

General Synod will be held in October of 2021. Pastor Sherri Meyer-Veen will be attending.

Recently, we were able to hire Seth Sholtes for a few hours a week., the children love having a young man who actively plays with them!

Schoharie Valley Community Day Camp 2021

The Day Camp team met on March 17^{th} and April 12^{th} to continue preparing for summer 2021. Day Camp will run from July 19-23. The decision has been made to hold camp in person. We will be using all three church sites: Schoharie Reformed Church, Schoharie United Presbyterian Church, and Christ the Shepherd Lutheran Church. This will allow us to maximize the number of campers we are able to have while adhering to COVID protocols regarding distancing.

Online registration is now open for campers. Camp is open to all children from age 4 through entering 8th grade.

Morning Camp = Age 4 through entering Grade 2 (8:30am-12pm)

<u>Full Day Camp</u> = Entering Grade 3 through Grade 8 (8:30-4pm)

Aftercamp Care for Full Day Campers aftercamp care is available on a limited basis (4pm-5:30pm)

Day Camp price is \$50 for the first child, with a \$90 family maximum. To register your child, please go to www.schohariereformedchurch.org and look for the Camp heading at the top of the page.

Enrollment numbers will be limited to 50% of capacity, so please register early.

We are always looking for people to step into leadership roles! There are openings for leaders in Arts & Crafts, Recreation, and Nature, as well as Assistant Directors. If you know of anyone in 10th grade or up that might be interested in a paid position, please have them check us out on Facebook under Schoharie Valley Community Camp. Volunteers will also be needed to help with everything from snacks, to preparing materials, to working with campers. We are blessed to have a group of volunteers coming from Michigan as well.

Food Pantry
