Adventing!



Let all that I am praise the LORD; with my whole heart, I will praise God's holy name. Let all that I am praise the LORD; may I never forget the good things God does for me. ³ God forgives all my sins and heals all my diseases. ⁴ God redeems me from death and crowns me with love and tender mercies. ⁵ God fills my life with good things. My youth is renewed like the eagles! -Psalm 103:1-5 NLT

As we journey together though this Advent season the theme of our worship has been "Come to your senses." As the Psalmist prays to God saying, "Let all that I am praise the LORD." We are reminded that all of who we are, especially as "multi-sensory" beings, can be used to connect and experience the wonder of God. We can experience God through all that we are in our spiritual, emotional, mental, AND physical selves – including our five senses (sight, smell, taste, hear and touch). After all, God created us in God's image. God created this beautiful world and us in it to care for and enjoy as we praise God with our whole being!

The season of Advent offers us many different opportunities and ways to connect to the hope,

peace, joy, and love of God through our senses in whatever state we might find ourselves this time of year.

The sight of holiday lights in a store window or on a front lawn can connect us to the hope that God is the light the darkness cannot overcome. The sound of Christmas carols can give voice to feelings we may have trouble expressing and remind us of the Good News that God is with us as our peace so we can, *"rest beside the weary road and hear the angels sing."* The smell of fresh pine or freshly baked food can bring back joyful childhood memories we cherish or help remind us that God is the giver and sustainer of life, especially in hard times. The taste of sweet treats or a hot meal can help connect us to the wonder of God's love and remind us that we are both gracious receivers and givers of that love. The touch of holiday card or a simple gift can connect us to the reality that we can be, and others can be for us, the very presence of God to heal, bless, and inspire. Advent is a season that awakens us in the darkest of times to the light of God's presence with us as our hope, peace, joy, and love!

In what ways are you experiencing and connecting with God this Advent season? In what ways is God connected with you? How are you longing to experience God this Advent season for yourself or the world around you? Take some time to share with God your gratitude and/or your longing this Advent Season.

It is no accident how our five senses help draw us into the Advent season. The ways our bodies engage with the world helps us to engage our faith as well. We experience all of our world through our senses, and because God is our "Emmanuel" (God with us), not just a long time ago, but still today, we can experience God through our senses. Engaging the sights, sounds, tastes, smells and touches of Advent can connect us with God, and offer us not just fond memories, or joyous experiences, but also holy moments with our Savior as well as opportunities to bless others.

This work of connecting and engaging our senses with God is what we are to do during Advent. Advent is not meant to be a time to simply sit back and observe and it is not something that just happens to us because it is "the most wonderful time of the year." It is something we are to actively engage in as God's beloved children. *"Let all that I am praise the LORD.* Advent is not just a noun. It is a verb. We are to be "Adventing" throughout this season as we prepare to celebrate the coming of Christ and as we look with hope to Christ's coming again. Adventing by growing our awareness of the darkness in our lives and in the world, repenting of our role in it, and seeking to bring more of God's light through prayer and action. Adventing by giving generously to one another, as well as practicing asking for what we need, and be gracious receivers of the gifts of others. Adventing by showing compassion to one another, especially those who are on our own "naughty" lists. Adventing by making time for God to comfort, challenge, and change the places in us that need it most. Adventing by sharing the love and hope of God with others as people of God's presence.

This Advent let us engage in "Adventing" together using all our senses to connect and experience the wonder, and praise the God who comes to us as Emmanuel, God with us, and the light the darkness cannot overcome. Let us see, touch, taste, smell, and hear the good news!


<u>Congregational Birthday</u> <u>Celebration</u>

CELEBRATING THE 300th ANNIVERSARY OF THE SCHOHARIE REFORMED CHURCH

WHEREAS, Religious institutions, and the many spiritual, social, and educational benefits they confer, play a vital role in the development of the moral fabric of a responsible citizenry; and

WHEREAS, It is the tradition of this State and this Nation to pay tribute to those institutions and individuals who have contributed to the ethical and spiritual values of their communities; and

WHEREAS, Attendant to such concern, I, New York State Senator Peter Oberacker, am proud to commemorate the 300th anniversary of the Schoharie Reformed Church on November 14, 2021; and

WHEREAS, Throughout the storied history of New York State, there have emerged among its noble institutions, certain houses of worship which have become distinguished through their spiritual leadership and commitment to service, and therefore warrant special recognition; the Schoharie Reformed Church is one such institution; and

WHEREAS, The Schoharie Reformed Church has weathered many obstacles in its three hundred years; the Church, also known as The High Dutch Reformed Church of Schoharie and The German Reformed Church of Schoharie, was formally approved in 1721; in 1777, the Church was fortified to defend against a possible attack by the British and the Indians; and

WHEREAS, That anticipated attack occurred in October 1780, as the valley was mostly destroyed; a skirmish took place with two cannon balls striking the Church, thankfully without major damage; and

WHEREAS, Between the Civil War and the 2000s, the Church remained central to life in Schoharie; the Church installed two women in 1956 to the consistory, being the first in the denomination to do so, and continues to have women serve on the consistory and in the pulpit; and

WHEREAS, The Church faced a serious challenge in August 2011, when Hurricane Irene devastated the Schoharie Valley; most of the homes in the Village of Schoharie were uninhabitable, and the Church was equally devastated, with recovery continuing to this day; and

WHEREAS, Nevertheless, the Church remains steadfast in its service, with doors open to everyone; and

WHEREAS, It is the custom of this Legislative Body to take note of venerable institutions such as the Schoharie Reformed Church, commemorating a milestone of its glorious history, and recognizing its faithful ministry on behalf of its members; now, therefore, be it

PROCLAIMED, That I, New York State Senator Peter Oberacker, commemorate the 300th anniversary of the Schoharie Reformed Church, noting with gratitude and respect the ministry it caringly provides on behalf of its congregation; and be it further

PROCLAIMED, That a copy of this proclamation be transmitted to the Schoharie Reformed Church.
