<u>Be Still</u>

"Be still, and know that I am God. I will be exalted among the nations I will be exalted in the earth!" – Psalm 46:10

The holiday season is fully upon us. This time of year always seems to bring with it an increased level of stress and anxiety, as well as busyness. From decorating to shopping, from baking to wrapping, from parties to programs, the holiday season is full of so many wonderful things to see and do with hardly enough time to do it all. Yet, as the people of God, we recognize that this time of year is more than just a holiday season, it is a holy season. It is the season of Advent! The word "Advent" comes from a Latin word meaning "coming." We are in a season of anticipation and preparation for God's in-breaking into our world. We celebrate Christ's coming, and we anticipate Christ's coming again. Advent is a time for us to rekindle our hearts and lives with the light of the world that the darkness cannot overcome!

During Advent we take intentional time to reflect, to repent, to pray, and to prepare our hearts and our lives to join with the reality of God alive and moving in our world. This Advent season, our theme is "Be Still and Know." This verse from Psalm 46 invites us into a different posture than perhaps we are used to amid all the hustle and bustle of the holidays. To be still and know is to take intentional time out of all the busyness to align our hearts and lives with the true reason for the season, and to let God's in-breaking remake our hearts and lives anew.

It is important to recognize that to be still and know is not the same as being static, or stuck. It is not about being the "Frozen Chosen," as the common criticism of Christians who go to church, but do not live out their faith in the world. It is not about taking a back seat while saying, "God will take care of it, please pass the eggnog." Instead, it is just the opposite, to be still and know, is to intentionally chose to not get all-wrapped up (pun intended) in the holiday hoopla that we miss the power and purpose of Advent to reorient our lives around the truth of God.

There are lots of ways we can "Be Still and Know" throughout this Advent season. We can take time to be still and know through an Advent devotional, or time set aside for prayer. We can be still and know through our corporate worship together or through intentional practices of solitude or simplicity. We can also be still and know through participating in acts of service, or in making special gifts for others. As Pastor Sherri mentioned in her sermon for the first Sunday of Advent, we can even be still and know in baking the cookies and wrapping the presents by sharing with God why we are thankful for each person who will receive them and pray for them. Whatever ways you choose, the purpose is to connect with God in ways that help to reshape our being and our living. Advent is a season of coming and every year at this time we remind ourselves and one another once again of the truth that Christ has come and Christ will come again. May we continue to build our hearts, lives, and church community to grow evermore fully into the hope, peace, joy and love that Christ's coming brings.

One of Pastor Sherri's favorite songs is by a group called Watermark. The song is entitled "Still" and here are some of the lyrics to that song that speak to the theme of be still and know really well –

Of this world, it falls around me and flutters all its beauty in my eyes but let me choose the solitude simplicity has always simply changed my life cause even stillness makes me move cause that's when my heart learns to dance with you.

Our hope and prayer for you and for all of us in this Advent season is that we will make room for and choose intentional moments and practices of stillness that our hearts may learn to dance with God, drawing us into God's presence to empower all of our being and living.

Miscellaneous Stuff

We need approximately six child outlet plug covers for certain Fellowship Hall electric receptacles. If you have any laying around, give them to Dave Toborg.

There are numerous "little" jobs (install door sweeps, weather stripping, vacuum, painting, building shelves, etc.) that you can do yourself at your convenience. Contact Dave (295-8554, dtoborg@midtel.net) if you can help out.

<u>Winter stuff</u>

Snow-After a 1" snowfall, our snow plow contractor plows the parking lot and shovels the steps, ramp, and street sidewalk. Lesser amounts, however, are our responsibility - so please be encouraged to grab a broom and/or shovel for the nuisance snows that pop up all winter long. Don't wait for someone else to do it. Especially keep the steps and ramp clear so the sun can do its thing thereby reducing usage of ice melting agents.

Note that we use plastic shovels (without steel edges) to minimize damage to the wooden steps and ramp. When necessary, there is a beige plastic tote full of magnesium chloride on the Heritage House porch. Compared to rock salt, magnesium chloride is less corrosive to the steel fasteners holding together the wooden steps and ramps.

Heat-Both buildings have programmable thermostats. If you need to raise the temperature for an event, simply press the up arrow until the desired temperature shows (typically 68°). And remember to turn it down when you leave. If the schedule needs permanent adjustment AND you are comfortable doing so, then go ahead and change the program. If not, contact Dave Toborg.







<u>Clothing Drop-Off Shed</u>

We are now hosting a St. Pauly Textile, Inc. clothing drop-off shed. Delivered Thanksgiving week behind the Heritage House, this used clothing company provides a convenient and clean donation program that serves the community while helping the SRC financially.

What kind of items can be donated? Useable clothing, shoes, belts, purses, blankets, sheets, curtains, pillowcases, and stuffed animals. Items need to be in tied plastic bags.

Unacceptable items are electronics, books, household items, toys, garbage, pillows, rags, or fabric scraps.

What does the company do? St. Pauly empties the shed weekly/biweekly depending on volume and pays us 4 cents per pound of clothing.

St. Pauly sells the clothing in bulk to other companies that, in turn, contract with government agencies, relief organizations, and private companies that redistribute the clothing around the world. The geographic destinations depends on what is happening in the world at any given time.

Can the SRC use the clothing? If there is ever a need, the SRC can sort through donations to pick out items for a specific need or event (i.e. family in need, rummage sale).

Food Pantry

With the holiday season upon us and heating cost the Food Pantry is continuing to serve many families in the area. The items of need are: eggs, tuna, cereal, pasta, pasta sauce, canned yams/vegetables/ gravy/cranberry sauce, box stuffing, canned ravioli/beef stew/soup/spaghetti o's/chili with beans. Other items of great need are laundry & dish detergent, paper products and cleaning supplies. In addition to our Food Pantry box in the Narthex items may be dropped off at SUPC on Tuesdays thru Fridays from 11:00am till 3:00pm.
