A Season of Becoming:

"Seek the Lord while God may be found; call on the Lord while God is near. As the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return to it without watering the earth and making it bud and flourish, so that it yields seed for the sower and bread for the eater, so is my word that goes out from my mouth: It will not return empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it."

As the cold and snow of February is upon us, I (Pastor Mike) have come to realize that I often find myself in a wintery conflict this time of year. There is a part of me that is jealous of the bears! I long to join them in their wintry hibernation where I can sleep right through the cold and bitterness of winter until I awake in the warmth and the sunlight of springtime! But there is another part of me that sees this time more like the seeds that are germinating in the ground – a season of becoming. When I look at winter this way, I often find a great hope and anticipation for this time of year. This season holds potential to try new things, to create new routines, to try and break old habits, and to live into new ways of being for my health and for my life.

Some of the questions I want to invite us all to wonder about in this winter season are how are we "seeking," and who are we "becoming?" How are we connecting our hearts and lives to the Light of The World we recently celebrated in the gift of Emmanuel – "God with us"? I want to challenge you to take some time to reflect on questions like these and to do so without shame. This is not about being good/bad, right/wrong, rather it is about recognizing what is, and where we want to be! The truth for all of us as human beings living our lives is that without intentional effort who are now is who we will continue to be. So, what does our present have to show us about our future, and what do we want it to show? In other words, *what does your life show about who you are seeking to become?* If I want to lose some weight this winter (which I do) what do my current exercise and eating habits show me? What changes do I need to make? What challenges do I need to step more courageously into for my life to become something healthier in this season?

Additionally, I want to seek the Lord by opening up my Bible more, and reading some good books that will help challenge me and grow my faith. I want to engage with others in a small group and I want to be more connected to God and others through times of worship. I also want to take more time to play and be together as a family at the ice-skating rink, on the sledding hill, or around the fireplace at home.

In all of this, I want to recognize that during these winter months I can still enjoy a long nap (but not hibernate), and I can live into this time as a "season of becoming," so that the seeds of God's love and purposes can take deeper root in me.

I wonder what potential, what hope, what rest, and what renewal these winter months hold for you? I hope you will open your heart to wonder and your courage to try new things as we wait for the arrival of Spring. Despite the cold, we hope to see you all as a part of worship when you are able so that we can continue to share together how God is working in our hearts and lives in this special season! Here is a wonderful poem by the late Mary Oliver entitled, "Starlings in Winter" to help inspire us in this season of becoming. Blessings,

Schoharie Community Food Pantry Report for 2018

In 2018 a total of 152 families visited the food pantry at least once, which is nearly identical to 2017. Those families were made up of 500 individuals; 193 children, 259 adults (18-64) and 48 seniors. These 152 families collectively visited the pantry 961 times, which is nearly 100 more visits than in 2017. When the number of persons in each family is multiplied by the number of times that particular family visited the pantry, the total number of people actually served is arrived at. That figure for 2018 is 2,643, an increase over 2017 but still less than 2016.

Of the 152 families served, most utilized the pantry on an emergency basis, visiting less than once per month. Fifty-one families visited only once, and 94 families (62% of total) visited five or less times. The families who utilize the pantry on a more regular basis, beyond periodic emergency are fewer, with only 35 families visiting 12 or more times.

We continue to participate in the Retail Store Donation Program through the Regional Food Bank. Practically speaking, this means that every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday morning one or more volunteers picks up food from Hannaford in Esperance. That food is then weighed and shelved by other volunteers. A total of 33,591 pounds of food was received and given out by the food pantry from this source alone in 2018! In addition, the pantry benefits from food drives done by Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Schoharie Helping Club, Postal Service, Fire Department/Kiwanis, just to name a few, as well as many individuals who give on their own or through their churches. There is no question but that total food donations exceed 40,000 pounds per year. In addition, we have a grant from the Regional Food Bank and we purchase food from them, at a greatly reduced cost, using that grant and our own financial resources. Due to an increase in the number of feeding programs which exist, our grant from the Food Bank has been reduced, so we are spending more of our food pantry savings each year. As of September 30, 2018, the balance in the food pantry account was \$8,900.05.

The operation of the food pantry would not be possible without our dedicated volunteers. At any given time between 25 and 30 people are involved in this ministry. All glory be to God, who enables and guides our way! Food pantry donations are appreciated to help others in need. In addition to our Food Pantry box in the Narthex items may be dropped off at SUPC on Tuesdays thru Fridays from 11:00am till 3:00pm. Monetary donations are appreciated as well, checks may be made out to Schoharie Valley Food Pantry. The Food Pantry is in need of volunteers to man the food pantry on Tues. and Thurs. Buildings & Grounds



In my report at the Annual Congregational Meeting last month, I briefed folks on my initial research into maintenance and preservation of our nine stained glass windows. This is the largest building project on the horizon.

Our nine windows were a significant component of the 1894 major renovation of the Church building (which included the organ and pews). They are protected with circa 1980s wood-frame Plexiglass storm windows.

To date, one contractor has reviewed the windows and provided a proposal. He pointed out how age, gravity, and heat affect the windows – the lead lattice settles and sags to the point where gaps appear, glass cracks, and/or pieces fall out. This is easily seen on our windows. The five units with a southern or western exposure are particularly showing their age; and all the storm windows are rotting. That contractor proposed \$125,000 to completely rebuild the five worst windows, repair the other four (to extend their service life another 15 to 20 years), and install all new storm windows.

Obviously, this would be a significant undertaking and more research is necessary before any decision is made. My plan is to meet with other contractors, and identify alternatives such as doing nothing or installing plain glass windows.

The congregation needs to begin thinking and praying about our stewardship of the windows. What do they mean to our Church family? What is the best direction?

Fundraising will be needed. Are grants available? Are there unusual fundraising ideas that we don't typically think of? If this is important to you – ask God how you can help.

More to come.

In the meantime, please see me if you would like an in-person review of the windows.
