Deepening Love

"Now, most people would not be willing to die for an upright person, though someone might perhaps be willing to die for a person who is especially good. But God showed God's love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners." – Romans 5:7-8

There was a recently published quote from a pastor named Rev. Ben Cremer who said, "Christianity should feel like, 'my love for others continues to deepen, not 'my beliefs are more correct than anyone else's.'" This quote is meant to challenge us to wonder - Do I have a love that continues to deepen? Is my love growing for others in our church, in our community, and in the world? What about for those with whom I continually find myself in deep disagreement, or who tends to stir up my anger and resentment? If I do not, then what is keeping me from deepening my love, and how do I begin to deepen it?

The answer is not always as easy or as simple as "just loving more." Some of us have experienced deep wounding or abuse and have trauma from loved ones who have hurt us. As a result, our hearts become guarded in an effort to protect

ourselves. But when we guard our hearts to keep them from being hurt by others, we also run the risk of closing them off from receiving love from others, especially the love God has for us. In his book on the four loves, author CS Lewis writes these words about trying to guard ourselves from being hurt by love:

"There is no safe investment. To love at all is to be vulnerable. Love anything, and your heart will certainly be wrung and possibly be broken. If you want to make sure of keeping it intact, you must give your heart to no one, not even to an animal. Wrap it carefully round with hobbies and little luxuries; avoid all entanglements; lock it up safe in the casket or coffin of your selfishness. But in that casket – safe, dark, motionless, airless – it will change. It will not be broken; it will become unbreakable, impenetrable, irredeemable. The alternative to tragedy, or at least to the risk of tragedy, is damnation. The only place outside Heaven where you can be perfectly safe from all the dangers and perturbations of love is Hell." - CS Lewis, The Four Loves.

It can be tempting to continually seek those in our lives who are "worthy" of our love, or who are "safe" to love, to help minimize the risk of getting hurt. But as we look to God's love in the way Paul describes it in his letter to the Romans, we are reminded that God's love for us was not based on our "worthiness" or God's own "safety" in loving us. It was based on God's choice to love from God's own heart. In a similar manner our love is never meant to be dependent on what other people do, or how they behave.

The ability to love comes from the Holy Spirit at work within us. It deepens when we continue to have our hearts nourished with God's love and when we are courageous in giving our love away to others as God first loved us! If our love is dependent on others it will be sporadic and fickle at best. But if our love comes from the heart of God poured out in us, along with our desire to be people who love it can have a powerful impact on the world.

Now love does not mean opening ourselves up to abuse or fully accepting every aspect of another person. But love does challenge us to not base it on the actions or worthiness of the other, but instead to connect to the love God has for us, "even while we were yet sinners," and to be courageous in offering that love out of a desire to be people of love. This is not always easy, and often there is a risk of hurt and rejections, but as the old song goes and still rings true, "What the world needs now is love sweet love. It's the only thing that there's just too little of. What the world needs now is love, sweet love. **No not just for some, but for everyone."**

Perhaps the most challenging part of this truth is that for us as Christians "everyone" includes our enemies. A main component, and unique aspect of the love we are to share with the world as followers of Jesus is love for our enemies. If they are to know we are Christians by our love, then we need to continue to challenge ourselves, and deepen our faith that this may continue to become a part of our lives and our witness as the people of God and as the church.

In this month where we celebrate love through chocolates, flowers, and cards. May we also celebrate the love God has for us and challenge ourselves as Christians to continue to deepen that love, even with our enemies that indeed, "they will know we are Christians by our love."

<u>Clothing Drop-Off Shed</u>

St. Pauly Textile, Inc. clothing drop-off shed is behind the Heritage House, this used clothing company provides a convenient and clean donation program that serves the community while helping the SRC financially.

What kind of items can be donated? Useable clothing, shoes, belts, purses, blankets, sheets, curtains, pillowcases, and stuffed animals. Items need to be in tied plastic bags. Unacceptable items are electronics, books, household items, toys, garbage, pillows, rags, or fabric scraps.

What does the company do? St. Pauly empties the shed weekly/biweekly depending on volume and pays us 4 cents per pound of clothing. St. Pauly sells the clothing in bulk to other companies that, in turn, contract with government agencies, relief organizations, and private companies that redistribute the clothing around the world. The geographic destinations depends on what is happening in the world at any given time.

Can the SRC use the clothing? If there is ever a need, the SRC can sort through donations to pick out items for a specific need or event (i.e. family in need, rummage sale).

<u>After School Program</u>

The advisory committee for the Schoharie Christian After School Program met on January 19th. We interviewed and subsequently hired Mary Unser as a substitute for the program. The budget was reviewed, and the committee agreed to resume paying the Schoharie United Presbyterian Church for a portion of the utilities. The church had waved these fees during a period of low enrollment due to COVID. The staff are all being paid at the new minimum wage of \$13.20 per hour. We discussed possible purchases to be funded by a Stewart's Grant that we are applying for. Those potential purchases would include 2 new folding tables and a laptop computer. Schoharie Central School has agreed to provide bus transportation for our students during the cold weather. We also discussed purchasing reusable plastic cups for the students to cut costs and be more environmentally friendly. It has been my pleasure to serve on the advisory committee for the past several years. While I will no longer be serving as our consistory representative to the ASP, Larry Poulin has agreed to take on this role. Thank you, Larry! Edie Schultz and Jody DeJong continue to serve on the board along with Jessie Griffin who is our sub. The next ASP meeting will be held on March 23rd at 5:30 PM.

<u>SCHOHARIE COMMUNITY FOOD PANTRY REPORT FOR 2021</u>

In 2021 the Food Pantry never missed a beat, despite the continuing COVID-19 pandemic. Despite the extra physical work in taking food out to families as they stay in their cars, our volunteers have persevered and continued to provide excellent service.

For the 2021 calendar year, we served 160 families, consisting of 458 individuals. These families visited the pantry a total of 976 times during 2021, for an average of 81 visits per month. Most families visited infrequently, with fully 111 (69%) visiting six or fewer times during the entire year. 50 families (31%) visited just once in the year. Since we are considered an emergency food pantry, these numbers confirm that we continue to fulfill that mission, rather than being a regular food source for most of our clients. At the other end of the spectrum, 33 families (21%) visited the pantry 12 or more times during the year. A review of these families shows that they are primarily made up of the elderly and folks with disabilities. All families are allowed to visit up to two times each month.

In 2021 we received food from a variety of sources. For example, we participate in the Retail Store Donation Program through the Regional Food Bank and our partner store is the Hannaford Market in Esperance. Three days per week our volunteers drive to Hannaford and pick up whatever they have for us. Other volunteers weigh that food and put it away, discarding anything that is inedible by the time it gets to us. In 2021 we received 49,103 pounds of food in that way! Typically this food is vegetables and fruits, pastries and bread, but we also receive some meat, deli and dairy products from this source.

We also order food from the Regional Food Bank which is delivered to Cobleskill and is picked up there by other volunteers. Deliveries come to us twice per month and we place orders in excess of 1000 pounds for most of those visits. That food is very inexpensive and sometimes free. We pay for it out of our annual grant from the Regional Food Bank and then from our own funds which are donated to us.

Additionally, many individuals and organizations drop food off, in small and large quantities all the time. During the pandemic, the Schoharie Masonic Lodge has been especially generous and regular in their giving, providing us not only with food but also paper products and personal care items. Other organizations and individuals regularly support the pantry with gifts of money, which is very much appreciated. During 2021 one individual won a freezer and \$500 worth of meat (provided by Hessian Hill Farm) and she donated both items to us, since they were not needed by her! Our community is extremely generous in taking care of the hunger needs of others.

The food pantry could not operate without the dedication of our volunteers, who number between 25 and 30 individuals. They are truly amazing and a gift from God and we are thankful for their continued dedication.

Food Pantry

Many families are in need of extra help; the Food Pantry is continuing to work hard to serve the many families in our community. With many families facing the high cost of winter heating expenses, non-perishable items such as canned fruits, boxed macaroni & cheese, tuna fish, pasta, pasta sauce, canned ravioli/beef stew/soup/spaghetti o's/chili with beans, canned vegetables, applesauce, peanut butter, jelly, cereal, jello packs, pudding packs, granola bars, fruit snacks, juice packs, & snack crackers. Additional items of need are cleaning supplies, paper products-paper towels/ toilet paper, personal hygiene items such as hand soap, toothpaste, shampoo and shower soaps. Items may be left in the SRC Narthex or dropped off at SUPC on Tuesdays or Thursday from 12noon till 2:00pm or they may be left between the doors of the educational building. Monetary donations are appreciated as well, checks may be written to "Schoharie Valley Food Pantry".
