# Wonder as We Wander!

"Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him."

- Matthew 2:2 NIV

The season of Epiphany invites us into a time of Wonder as we celebrate the journey of the Magi who followed a star beyond the expected palace of Herod to the place where they met the new born king, the child Jesus. Then having worshipped him with their gifts of Gold, Frankincense, and Myrrh, and being warned in a dream, they went home by another way. We celebrate Epiphany as the culmination of the 12 days of Christmas. Epiphany reminds us that the promise of "Emmanuel – God with us," is for the whole world, all nations, every person. It is a time for us to celebrate, rejoice, and ponder this wonderful reality for our lives and our world. This is the season of Epiphany. This is the season of light! So, as many of us go about the traditional work of "de-Christmasing" our homes of trees, lights, and decorations, and as we enter into this New Year, and this winter season, we want to invite you to wonder with us, "How will I stay alert and keep my life open to experiencing, being transformed by, and sharing the wonder of God going on around me and within me?

To help us reflect on this further, here is a thoughtful story told by Rabbi-Yisroel Bernath of a real experiment done by the Washington Post in 2007:

In Washington DC, at a Metro Station, on a cold January morning in 2007, a man with a violin played six Bach pieces for about 45 minutes. During that time, approximately

2000 people went through the station, most of them on their way to work.

After about four minutes, a middle-aged man noticed that there was a musician playing. He slowed his pace and stopped for a few seconds, and then he hurried on to meet his schedule.

About four minutes later, the violinist received his first dollar. A woman threw money in the hat and, without stopping, continued to walk.

At six minutes, a young man leaned against the wall to listen to him, then looked at his watch and started to walk again.

At ten minutes, a three-year old boy stopped, but his mother tugged him along hurriedly. The kid stopped to look at the violinist again, but the mother pushed hard and the child continued to walk, turning his head the whole time. This action was repeated by several other children, but every parent - without exception - forced their children to move on quickly.

At forty-five minutes: The musician played continuously. Only six people stopped and listened for a short while. About twenty gave money but continued to walk at their normal pace. The man collected a total of \$32.

#### After one hour:

He finished playing and silence took over. No one noticed and no one applauded. There was no recognition at all.

No one knew this, but the violinist was Joshua Bell, one of the greatest musicians in the world. He played one of the most intricate pieces ever written, with a violin worth \$3.5 million dollars. Two days before, Joshua Bell sold-out a theater in Boston where the seats averaged \$100 each to sit and listen to him play the same music.

This is a true story. Joshua Bell, playing incognito in the D.C. Metro Station, was organized by the Washington Post as part of a social experiment about perception, taste and people's priorities. This experiment raised several questions:

In a common-place environment, at an inappropriate hour, do we perceive beauty?

If so, do we stop to appreciate it?

Do we recognize talent in an unexpected context?

One possible conclusion reached from this experiment could be this:

If we do not have a moment to stop and listen to one of the best musicians in the world, playing some of the finest music ever written, with one of the most beautiful instruments ever made... How many other things are we missing as we rush through life?"

What do you need to do, or not do, in order to experience more of God's wonder in creation, in relationships with others, in time with God, and in the expressions and experiences of your own life?

Our hope for the beginning of this New Year is that we would more deeply open our lives to experiencing, being transformed by, and sharing with one another the true Wonder of Emmanuel – God with us in our lives and in our world!
