Calling on A Big God!

"I cried out to God for help; I cried out to God to hear me. When I was in distress, I sought the Lord; at night I stretched out untiring hands and my soul refused to be comforted. Your ways, O

God are holy. What god is so great as our God? You are the God who performs miracles; you display your power among the peoples." - Psalm 77:1-2,13-14.

I recently learned about "The Success Project" that was put together by Strayer University in Virginia and media company SoulPancake. As a part of their Success Project they created an event called, "Shout It Out." They placed a giant red megaphone in a busy city plaza and invited people to come and speak their dreams aloud as a way of helping to inspire them and others. The company SoulPancake says, "We all have goals and dreams that we want to accomplish in life, but sometimes we're reluctant to put them out into the world for fear of judgment or failure. So, we decided to build a giant megaphone and invite passersby to step up, and shout them out."

When I (Pastor Mike) first read about this my immediate thought was how great it would be to put up our own giant red megaphone on the front lawn of the church! What do you think Dave Toborg? Then we could invite anyone who wanted to "Shout It Out!" But my hope in this would be that we would shout out more than just our own personal dreams. I would love to see us shout out deep prayers, laments, joys, hopes, angers, frustrations, yearnings, confessions, needs, praises, blessings, and whatever else might be on our hearts and to speak them aloud before God and our community. The purpose of the giant megaphone is not because God has a hard time hearing us, but rather because we believe in a really big God who takes our prayers seriously, and invites us to courageously step into big things!

I really love the honesty and boldness of the words of the Psalmist written above. As the Psalmist cries out in need to God, he/she declares, "and my soul refused to be comforted." Then the Psalmist takes time to recall the greatness, the power, and the deeds of God. The refusal of the Psalmist to be comforted is not a resistance to God, but rather a resistance to anyone or anything but God. *This Psalmist refuses to be comforted by anything LESS than the God of power, might, miracles, and redemption.*

Is this true of your life? There is a temptation for us in the church today to settle for the routines and the familiar comforts of religion. We gather together and sing the classic hymn, "I Sing the Mighty Power of God" but do we go out expecting God's mighty power to shape our lives and impact the world? I often think of the quote by CS Lewis from his essay entitled, The Weight of Glory. "It would seem that Our Lord finds our desires not too strong, but too weak. We are *half-hearted creatures, fooling about with drink* and sex and ambition when infinite joy is offered us, like an ignorant child who wants to go on making mud pies in a slum because he cannot imagine what is meant by the offer of a holiday at the sea. We are far too easily pleased."

This summer we are entitling our worship series, "Catch the Wind." God's Spirit of awesome power, generous love, extravagant grace, and incredible wonder is moving throughout our world. The Good News of this is that God is inviting us into an amazing life with this Spirit. But we must have courage to move beyond comfortable and familiar religion. We too, like the Psalmist, must step up to the megaphone of our hearts and our faith and call upon the greatness of our God, naming the dreams God has given us, and stepping into living our faith wherever God places us!

<u>Sunday School</u>

A New Potential Plan for Sunday School!!!



The growing and maturing of our youngest disciples through the Christian Education ministry of the Schoharie Reformed Church

continues to be a priority for us. As we continue to consider moving our regular worship time to 9:30am beyond the months of July and August, our Sunday school volunteers are also working to be able to provide a wonderful program for our youth to fit with this possible change in worship time.

The new possible plan would involve splitting the Sunday school in three different groups. The first group, Pre-K through 2nd grade, would go downstairs to the community room following the children's time during the worship service. They would then have their Sunday school lesson until the end of the worship service. The other two groups, 3rd-4th, and 5th-beyond, would come to the Heritage House following the sermon and their Sunday School time would run 15 minutes past the end of the worship service (10:45am). Then parents could get their kids and take them home. In addition to this there would be no Sunday school on communion Sundays, so that families could partake of communion together (the first Sunday of every month). Also, there would be a time of praise, singing for kids and families 15 minutes prior to the start of the worship service.

If it is decided that the worship time should remain at 10:30am for the fall, then the current Sunday School design of 9:15 to 10:15 will remain in effect for the coming year. Food Pantry

June 6, 2019 update -At the Food Pantry, May was again a very busy month. We had 138 families visit us in total, representing over 310 individuals served. As of this moment our shelves are quite bare. Also in May, we received and gave out over 4,300 pounds of food from Hannaford alone, which was supplemented by food that we purchased and other donations which we received. If you know a Food Pantry volunteer – there are some 25 of them – please thank them for the hard work and dedication to this ministry. <u>Buildings and Grounds</u>



Pews - The four benches that formerly wrapped around balcony posts have been patched; and the legs that were in need of shims have been done. With the arrival of warm weather, the final coat of polyurethane is being applied to all the pews (¬ looking for help).

Fellowship Hall – The acoustics of the Fellowship Hall are much improved due the installation of strategically placed sound absorbing acoustic panels. Reduced sound wave reflection allows large gatherings of people to better carry on conversations. We purchased the materials and fabricated the panels ourselves, then installed them in strategic locations for maximum effect. An O'Connor Foundation 50% grant will help pay for the project.





Note: Acoustic panels are <u>not bulletins boards</u>. The panels are fragile; please do not pin anything to them.

During the summer months our church is in need of volunteers to help maintain the beauty of the Church. Volunteers are needed to pull weeds and tend to the landscaping in front of the Church and Heritage House. We ask that if able would you periodically spend some time to help maintain the landscape. Thank you for assisting with the beautification of our Church grounds.
