"Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. In fulfillment of God's own purpose God gave us birth by the word of truth, so that we would become a kind of first fruits of God's creatures."

James 1:17-18

In the Old Testament the "first fruits" where meant to be set aside as gifts of stewardship that the people of God would bring to the priests for the praise of God and for the blessing of those who could not provide for themselves. We find the practice of first fruits and tithes in Deuteronomy 26. In the opening verses the author writes, "When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for God's name" (Deut. 26:1-2). given a verbal response to say to the priests.

They were to dedicate the tithe of a tenth of their "first fruits" to God and then share it with one another. But that's not all! They were also given a verbal response to say to the priests. This response was a reciting of the history of their deliverance from Egypt by God. Why was all this necessary? Well, it wasn't because God needed it, or was particularly hungry after 40 years of wandering in the desert with the Israelites. Instead it was so God's people did not forget God once they arrived in the Promised Land, in the land of abundance, the land described as "flowing with milk and honey."

I wonder if we haven't lost some of this in our own understanding of stewardship today? It can be very tempting, especially in the affluence of our American culture, to forget about our story with God. The danger of forgetting is that our stewardship changes from being a part of our core identity into a begrudging task of religious observance. When this happens, we come to view of our gifts as less of "first fruits" and more as "left overs," remembering God and God's mission in the world only after we have taken care of ourselves by our own means (or so we think). There is a wonderful line in one of our prayers of confession that says, "We have become so busy trying to make a living that we have missed the life you set among us."

So how can we change this? In his epistle James, the brother of Jesus, gives us a wonderful reminder that while we may no longer give our literal "first fruits" we are, because of Christ, a type of first fruit of God's creatures. What James is conveying is that our whole being is a gift of stewardship! James doesn't see it solely as something we "do" but rather a part of the core identity of who we are in Christ.

What would it mean to see your whole life, your being, as a gift of stewardship to God and to the world? How would it impact the ways you use your material and monetary gifts, your spiritual and physical gifts, your time, and your relationships with others? These are the things we will wonder about together in our worship this month.

November is our annual stewardship month. Together as a church family we want to discover the deeper reality that stewardship is "a way of life." We are, as a part of our core identity a type of "first fruits" of God's creatures. This year, as we consider stewardship together and as we prepare to bring our pledges to God, let us be challenged to see our very lives as gifts from God, for God, and for the blessings of others! Let us find the freedom to live into this reality in powerful ways that God may be praised and we might be blessed.

Fall Clean-Up

Saturday, November 3, 9:00 AM. The focus will be on raking leaves, cleaning out the flower beds, trimming shrubs, and general outside clean-up in preparation for winter. Winter is coming

Snow After a 1" snowfall, our snow plow contractor plows the parking lot and shovels the steps, ramp, and the street sidewalk. Lesser amounts, however, are our responsibility- so please be encouraged to grab a broom and/or shovel for the nuisance snows that pop up all winter long. Don't wait for someone else to do it. Especially keep the steps and ramp clear so the sun can do its thing thereby reducing usage of ice melting agents.

Note that we use plastic shovels (without steel edges) to minimize damage to the wooden steps and ramp. When necessary, there is a beige plastic tote full of magnesium chloride on the Heritage House porch. Compared to rock salt, magnesium chloride is less corrosive to the steel fasteners holding together the wooden steps and ramps.

Heat Both buildings have programmable thermostats. If you need to raise the temperature for an event,



simply press the up arrow until the desired temperature shows (typically 68°). And remember to turn it down when you leave. If the schedule needs permanent adjustment AND you are comfortable doing so, then go ahead and change the program. If not, contact Dave Toborg.
